POLITICS

Regulations in force

- 1) Regulation 21(1), P.U.(A)395/1993: An officer in the Top Management Group and the Managerial & Professional Group is prohibited from taking an active part in political activities. The officer shall not:
 - a) make any public statement, whether orally or in writing, that would adopt a partisan view on any matter which is an issue between political parties;
 - b) publish or circulate books, articles, or leaflets of a political party;
 - c) canvass for votes;
 - d) act as an election agent;
 - e) stand for election for any post in any political party; and
 - f) hold any posit in any political party
- 2) Regulation 21(2), P.U.(A)395/1993: **Executing Group officers may stand for election / hold a post in a political party** after obtaining a written approval from:
 - a) Director General of Public Service common-users officers*
 - b) Secretary General of the Ministry non-common-users officers
 - Service Circular No. 5 Year 1996
 - * Federal Common-Users Services refer to services whose Head of Service is the Director General of Public Service.
- Regulation 21(2A), P.U.(A)395/1993: **Education Service officers Grades DG41 to DG48**, other than the Principal or Headmaster/Headmistress at an educational institution* and an officer holding an administrative post, **may stand for election** / hold a post / be appointed to a political party post after obtaining a written approval from the Secretary General of the Ministry of Education.

 - * Educational institutions are schools, Institutes of Teacher Education (IPG), English Language Teaching Centres (ELTC), matriculation colleges and *Institut Aminuddin Baki* (IAB) under the Ministry of Education Malaysia.

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| 3 | Implication of resignation / optional retirement | If an officer who has retired optionally / resigned to contest in an election lost in the election, can the officer join public service again? | An officer who has resigned may apply and be considered for reappointment to the public service by the Appointing Authority, in line with Regulation 7, Public Officers (Appointment, Promotion and Termination of Service) Regulations 2012 [P.U.(A)1/2012]. An officer who has retired optionally cannot be reappointed to the public service except at the Government's discretion due to a critical need for the officer's services. However, the officer can only be appointed on contract (contract of service) after obtaining the approval of YAB Prime Minister / YAB Deputy Prime Minister / Chief Secretary to the Government of Malaysia as set out in Service Circular Number 2 Year 2008 – Dasar dan Prosedur Pelantikan Secara Kontrak (contract of service). |

What should I do? 2) Can an officer help campaign or accompany the spouse who has been nominated in an election? | A KPT or P&P officer (except DG41-48 officers who have obtained the approval) is not allowed to perform the act at all. An officer from the Executing Group must obtain a prior approval from the designated approving authority. The activity of putting up a political party's flags by an individual can be interpreted as the individual's support for the political party. It can be categorised as canvassing for votes. A KPT or P&P officer (except DG41-48 officers who have obtained the approval) is not allowed to perform the act at all. An officer from the Executing Group must obtain a prior approval from the designated approving authority. The act of assisting / accompanying election candidates in campaigning is interpreted as supporting the political party and is also said as canvassing for votes. |
| 7 | Political parties' speeches | Can an officer attend or listen to speeches by political parties during an election? | To provide the people with the opportunity to obtain information directly from the political parties contesting regarding their respective manifestos, public officers (KPT, P&P and Executing Group) may attend/listen to speeches by political parties. |

| | | Can an officer 'Like' and 'Share' the Facebook or retweet articles related to politics? | A KPT or P&P officer (except DG41-48 officers who have obtained the approval) is not allowed to perform the act at all. An officer from the Executing Group must obtain a prior approval from the designated approving authority. If the article shows an inclination towards a certain political party, the activity may be interpreted as the officer's support for the political party. It can also be said as being politically active. |
